## Missouri Distinct Population of the Eastern Hellbender Salamander/Endangered Species Act: U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Announces Endangered Species Designation

## 03/11/2021

The United States Fish and Wildlife Service ("FWS") published a March 9th Federal Register Notice designating a Missouri distinct population of the eastern hellbender salamander ("Missouri DPS") as endangered under the federal Endangered Species Act ("ESA"). See 86 Fed. Reg. 13465.

The Missouri DPS is therefore added to the list of Endangered and Threatened Wildlife in Part 17 of title V of the Code of Federal Regulations. See 50 C.F.R. 17.11(h).

FWS describes the Missouri DPS range as completely within the boundaries of the State of Missouri. They are stated to occur in:

- Big River
- Big Piney River
- Courtois Creek
- Gasconade River
- Huzzah Creek
- Meramec River
- Niangua River
- Osage Fork of the Gasconade River

River-dwelling hellbenders are described as North America's largest salamanders. They can exceed two feet and reside in clear, fast-flowing mountain streams.

A separate subspecies of hellbender is the Ozark hellbender. It is found in the southern portion of Missouri and northern Arkansas. The Ozark hellbender was listed as endangered in 2011.
